College held a ceremony on July 6 to announce the appointment of Dr. Kathleen Nelson as its new interim president and welcome her to the institution.

"The board believes that Dr. Nelson will be a great fit for the interim president," said David Hinkle, chairman of Pierpont's Board of Governors. "With all of her experience and her vision for the college, she will be instrumental in leading us into our new chapter."

Dr. Nelson retired as President of Lake Superior College (LSC) in Duluth, Minnesota, having served in this capacity for 13 years. Following her retirement, she served as a Higher Education consultant with the Higher Learning Commission on regional accreditation issues including work with institutions seeking accreditation, revision of the AQIP pathway, fact-finding review for an institution with significant accreditation issue complaints, and several special assignments relating to individual institutions.

Dr. Nelson joined The Registry in 2019 and served as an interim president at Glenville State University in West Virginia during 2019-2020. Dr. Nelson's career includes secondary and post-secondary instruction, counseling and administration in student services and academic affairs. Mentoring and coaching higher education leaders have always been important aspects of her career and personal life.

Dr. Nelson has held various leadership roles in the Minnesota State higher education system, including her role as co-chair with the state's Chancellor of the 44-member Leadership Council and founding chair of the Minnesota OnLine Council (the state's online council consortium). Her work with continuous quality improvement processes led to the college's participation in the Higher Learning Commission's

Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP) accreditation system. This work and the college's recognition as a leader in online learning have distinguished LSC within higher education circles. Dr. Nelson served as a peer reviewer for the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) for 18 years, served on several HLC committees (Readers' Panel, Review Committee, Team Chair Corps, Facilitator Corps for AQIP) worked with all of the Commission's pathway programs, served on the board of trustees for seven years, served as the Board's Chair and as a representative to the Council of Regional Accrediting Commissions (CRAC). She also served as a special assignment consultant following her official retirement from LSC.

Dr. Nelson has been recognized twice by the statewide college student association as its "President of the Year," received the Sam Solon Lifetime Legislative Service award from community leaders and received recognition as one of the region's "Women in Leadership" award winners.

Dr. Nelson earned an Ed.D. in Educational Leadership from the University of St. Thomas, an M.A. in Educational Psychology/ Counseling from the University of Minnesota, Duluth and a B.A. in Speech Communication/Theater Arts and English Education from Hamline University. ■

Pierpont Community & Technical College assistant professor Rachel Beach, recently received an international award and recognition for her work in interior design.

Beach, the program coordinator of Pierpont's applied design program was awarded an honorable mention placement at the international 2021 LIV Hospitality Design Awards competition.

"[This award] helps validate all of the hard work I have put in throughout my career," said Beach. "Being recognized with an award like this after 30 years of hard work is an incredible feeling."

The LIV Design Awards is an international competition that recognizes excellence in hospitality architecture, interior design and guest experiences on a global scale. During the 2021 competition, there were

more than 400 submissions from 41 different countries around the world.

Beach was awarded for her proposed design of the third floor of Pierpont's Advanced Technology Center in Fairmont.

"Earlier this year, at the request of our former interim president, I designed a project for the yetto-be-completed floor of the ATC building on the campus of Pierpont," said Beach. "I used the collaboratorium design concept that was implemented in a few regions in the United States and many more in Europe."

ways. The design gives the institution the flexibility to use it as needed.

"I wanted to design a space that was multifaceted and flexible," said Beach. "I used the elements of collaboratorium design to answer the wide range of challenges in the higher education environment."

Pierpont's applied design program has two concentrations, interior design and fashion merchandising. While in the program, students learn a range of skills, including the ones used by Beach in her proposal.

"Designs are always changing and evolving," said Beach. "We teach our students the skills they need to become successful interior designers. That includes a multitude of design styles that help them adapt to the changing style popularities throughout the world. That's why I encourage my students to become lifelong learners and

> hope they will continue their design education as they grow in their professions."

Veterinary technicians play a major role in the health care of your beloved pet. They are the sidekick to the veterinarian, and some may even say that they are just as important.

But, over the last several years, there has been a growing need for qualified veterinary technicians in West Virginia, with many veterinary clinics and hospitals looking to local colleges for answers.

THAT'S WHERE PIERPONT COMES IN.

Pierpont Community & Technical College's Veterinary Technology (vet tech) program, which is designed to prepare students for careers in the dynamic field of veterinary medicine as veterinary technicians, is fully accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association (CVTEA). It trains the next generation of vet techs to work in all aspects of animal health, disease and welfare.

"The veterinary technician is a vital resource to any veterinary facility," says Anna Romano, assistant professor and program coordinator of Pierpont's Veterinary Technology program. "Technicians work hand in hand with veterinarians to care for the health and welfare of all animals."

The vet tech program, which has been serving the Fairmont community for decades, has built a reputation of providing students with a high-quality education. Previously ranked among one of the top 30 veterinary technology programs in the country, it

prepares students to hit the ground running when they begin their exciting careers as veterinary technicians.

"Graduates with an Associate Degree in Veterinary Technology have endless possibilities in the field of veterinary medicine," said Romano. "While most technicians are employed in small animal veterinary practices, there are endless opportunities in fields like emergency medicine, exotic animals, farm animals, zoos, research facilities and so much more. Wherever there is a need for a veterinarian, there will be a veterinary technician (or several) there to assist them!"

Career opportunities can even come in all shapes and sizes.

In recent years, the vet tech program has become more and more essential to the state of West Virginia. Along with the major shortage of qualified veterinary technicians in the state, there is expected to be significant job growth in the field.

"According to the Department of Labor, the projected growth for veterinary technologists and technicians will be faster than the average career path," said Dr. Michael Waide, provost and vice president of academic affairs at Pierpont. "There is expected to be a 15% increase in jobs over the next seven or so years."

"The field of veterinary technology is rapidly growing," adds Romano. "There almost isn't a facility that is not in need of more technicians."

The Pierpont vet tech program is meeting job demands by creating a curriculum that provides the quality and hands-on training that the veterinary medicine industry desperately needs.

"Our students are trained in all areas of veterinary practice, including anesthesia, surgical assisting, patient treatment and care or any other duty needed for animal care. We are preparing our graduates to work in any veterinary medicine scenario."

And with the expected growth, Pierpont has continued to show the importance of this program to the community. Last summer, a nearly \$2 million investment was announced that creates a brand new,

state-of-the-art facility to house the vet tech program at the site of the former Clarksburg Eye Center.

Remodeling of the facility, located on the same block as Pierpont's Gaston Caperton Center, includes updates to the existing building to create classrooms and handson learning spaces for students. This will include all new kennels to house the animals cared for by the program.

"The vet tech program, with its new state-of-theart center, will be there to meet the needs of the industry, preparing a skilled and qualified workforce for veterinarians and clinics throughout our area and West Virginia," said Dr. Waide.

The facility is expected to be completed by January and will be modeled like a modern veterinary hospital.

As the job demands of North Central West Virginia keep evolving, Pierpont will continue to evolve with it. By providing highly skilled workers, Pierpont continues to give its graduates, like those in vet tech, the opportunity to move this community into a brighter future.



"The fashion merchandising concentration covers a broad and evolving dynamic field," said Rachel Beach, assistant professor and program coordinator of Pierpont's Applied Design program. Throughout the course of the program, many students learn what it takes to become a successful entrepreneur. "When I was younger, I always told my parents I was going to be a teacher," said Stevens. "But as I got older, I gravitated more towards clothing. One major way to express your personality is through your clothes!"

Once she decided to pursue her passion, she began looking for a degree program that could turn those passions into a career. That's where she found Pierpont's Applied Design program.

"I was drawn to the exclusivity and smaller classes that the [Applied Design] program offered," said Stevens. "I loved how you're able to learn while working side-byside with your professor."

"As a student, Amanda was focused and driven with a strong passion for fashion design and the consumer sciences," adds Beach. "Amanda has taken her success in college and continued on in her professional path. We are very proud of her accomplishments and future endeavors in the fashion industry."

In February 2021, Stevens decided to take her education and create her very own clothing line. That was where A&K Clothing was born. Beginning as an online and pop-up shop, A&K Clothing rose to popularity shortly after its inception. Stevens, along with her fiancé Kyle Thompson, became regulars at local events where many of their unique items were offered.

After only a year of online sales and pop-up events, A&K grew to the point where expansion was needed.

"I started A&K Clothing online in February 2021 and we continued to grow through the rest of that year by doing pop up events," said Stevens. "We then invested enough to open a permanent storefront."

The A&K Clothing storefront, located at the Middletown Commons in Fairmont, offers a variety of options, including handmade bleached apparel, name brand denim, affordable high-end boutique items and exclusive designs that you can't get anywhere else.

"What separates our store from other boutiques is that half of my products are exclusively made by me that you won't find anywhere other than A&K Clothing," said Stevens. "We also carry items from three women-owned small businesses that also make their products! We want to support other local businesses as much as we possibly can."
